Ofcom plans to automatically extend batch of licences

As you know, Ofcom introduced a new, easy online licensing system in 2006 that requires amateur radio licensees to validate their licence details at least once every five years. If you have not already got your licence, you can see how easy it is at Ofcom's website: www.ofcom.org.uk/licensing/olc.

If your licence has an issue date between November 2006 and August 2007 and licensing details have not been amended since then, your licence will be due for validation around the time of the London Olympic and Paralympic Games in 2012.

During this time, Ofcom will be busy preparing for the event, making sure that the extra demand for spectrum is met, without causing interference. Therefore, Ofcom has decided this time round to automatically

extend the validation period of these amateur licences, for a further year – giving 6 years from the issue date. After this, these licence holders will need to update their licences themselves.

Ofcom has taken this decision to avoid having a large number of validations to process around the time of the London 2012 Games.

Ofcom's improved licensing website is now easier than ever to use with useful FAQs and tools to get you started. It will only take a few minutes to register your details and make any necessary updates to your licence.

All licensees and applicants are encouraged to register, apply or validate online – go to www.ofcom.org.uk/licensing/olc.

CISPR Meeting

Attending committee meetings can be very bland to the point of boring, the only positive is that sometimes(!) they are held in nice places. Not too often do I come away feeling good. This occasion was an exception.

I am a UK member of the CISPR I PLT project team, which is trying to develop acceptable changes to the product standards that would enable the 'standardised' implementation of PLT modems and networks. The meeting held in Lyons, France considered the responses from National Committees around the world to its latest draft proposal for changes.

The responses, on balance, line up against the committee draft, but of particular note in the response from the UK National Committee was the statement that the draft 'did not demonstrate protection of Radio Services'. This is a key demand by ITU.

In another section of the meeting, delegates from Japan demonstrated an automatic radiated field measurement system. This consisted of a self propelled trolley, containing a computer controlled measurement receiver, calibrated antennas, and GPS. The system was shown to be able to trundle around a site on which an access PLT system had been set up. The measurements made were quite remarkable, not only showing the extent of the radiation,

which was much greater than expected, but particularly showing that it is entirely possible to make quality radiation measurements. CISPR has always considered that radiation measurements are both too difficult, and result in significant uncertainty.

In another part of the meeting, where I am only an observer, I was treated to a very heart warming paper on radiated field measurements from plasma TV receivers. TV manufacturers from Korea, Japan and Germany conducted round-robin radiated emissions measurements on the same equipment. The results from each were within 2dB, confirming that given the right methodology 'radiated measurement' can be conducted, and at the same time showing that there are significant radiation issues with large screen plasma TV receivers, which will now be addressed.

The warm glow that several radio amateurs attending this meeting felt was because this work was done as a result of the issue of radiation that had been highlighted by radio amateurs, not least of which was our own Richard Marshall, G3SBA.

CISPR will almost certainly now be taking a fresh look at radiated field measurements. Great news for radio users.

And Finally

There is a saying that time flies when you are enjoying yourself and this certainly appears to have happened over the past two years during my term as President. The period has been far from uneventful, starting with the successful sale of the Society's property at Potters Bar and the purchase of new administrative offices in Bedford. One or two minor glitches notwithstanding, the move of personnel and belongings to Bedford was completed with resultant financial savings now starting to show through the accounts. These savings could be greater but current investment interest rates are not very attractive, however the Board continues to investigate alternative opportunities.

Less successful to date has been the development of the National Centre for Amateur Radio at Bletchley Park. Delays due to various factors beyond the control of the Society have meant a slippage of almost 18 months but it is now hoped that the Centre should be open by mid-2010, subject to tender processes and, of course, the weather.

As part of the headquarters reorganisation, a tender process was run to outsource the QSL bureau and this operation became fully operational during the latter part of 2008. Updates from the QSL Manager appear in *RadCom* on a regular basis.

We also appointed a new *RadCom* Editor at this time and this has resulted in letters and e-mails of approval being received from readers worldwide and a consequential increase in non-UK membership.

A new and greatly improved GB4FUN vehicle was commissioned on behalf of the Radio Communications Foundation and this has attracted a great deal of interest at the various venues it has attended. Recent publicity for regional volunteers to help in operating the vehicle has been very encouraging and it is anticipated that it will be seen in many more schools and colleges in the coming year.

In a somewhat controversial move, the decision was taken to disband the Technical Committee in the format it had held for a large number of years but in its place a Technical Forum was set up and this has proven to be very successful. A large number of technical enquiries are being received and dealt with, primarily through electronic means.

Discussions continue with Ofcom on a number of topics including the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games, the current licensing system and the forthcoming World Radio Conference in 2012. At the time of writing, a continuing major threat to users of the HF bands is the increasing numbers

of home networking power line adapters being introduced to the market. The Society considers that Ofcom have not met their legal obligations by failing to take enforcement action against PLA manufacturer Comtrend and BT Vision who distribute these products. The Society's legal advisers are currently studying all available documentation and are expected to have reported by the time you read this.

The Society supported the Lincoln Short Way Club in holding the very successful National Hamfest in October 2009 and feedback from both trade and visitors alike means the dates have already been agreed for next year. This, together with the rebadged RSGB Convention, has meant that October has become very much an amateur radio month in the UK.

During my period of office I have visited a selection of clubs spread around the country and I have to thank those clubs for the hospitality shown during those visits. What has struck me is that in the majority of these clubs there is very strong support for the RSGB. There are, of course, dissenters and this is to be expected, however I firmly believe that the majority of active amateurs in the UK support the Society in one form or another. If only more members would volunteer for vacancies that occur in the regional organisation then the level of support on a local basis could be improved. Let's not forget that not everyone is a member of their local club and prefer to do their own thing but support from a Deputy Regional Manager would no doubt still be welcomed if required.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the 1,500 or so volunteers that we have amongst our membership for all the hard, and in many cases, unrecognised work that they carry out on behalf of the Society. Whether it be in the field of EMC, planning, public service, radio sport or associated activities – thank you.

Of course, throughout the past two years I have also had the full support of my long suffering wife Gwen, G4JYL, who also put pen to paper last January for a *RadCom* editorial to outline her side of the story. This article received very positive feedback and a number of very complimentary comments as a result.

Finally, I would like to wish Dave Wilson, MOOBW who will be taking over the reins from January my very best wishes for the next two years. There are a number of challenges facing Dave but I will, of course, be there to lend support where required.

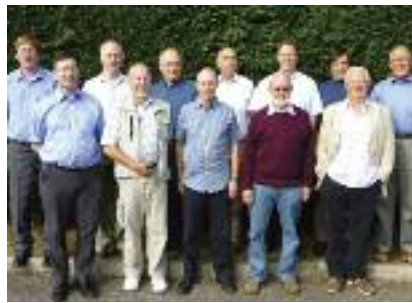

HF Propagation Predictions



For a couple of months now there has been a new web page on the RSGB website, the URL is www.rsgb.org.uk/propagation/index.php. This page is a more up to date copy of the predictions that appear in *RadCom*, it is updated at the beginning of each month, whereas the *RadCom* predictions are produced three months prior to publication. There are also a few more destinations in the list.

Also available from the same page is an Excel spreadsheet, specially designed for those who have vision impairment. This spreadsheet was produced with a different philosophy to the main page and displays the information in a completely different format, it will not necessarily totally agree with the main page.

As from November 2009 a new Excel spreadsheet was available, this one shows the same information as the main page and should agree with the figures, however, the output is presented in a different manner. Instead of being in a band order the new spreadsheet presents its data in time order, in two hour segments. The philosophy behind this is to present a spreadsheet for downloading and manipulation by the user. The only limitations being those imposed by the user themselves.

The RSGB has been very cooperative in presenting these tables for general use by radio amateurs and allowing add-ons such as these spreadsheets. The original (main) prediction table was programmed by Sylvan Katz, VE6ZX / G0TZX and G4FKH programmed the two spreadsheets, each month the production of the three tables (all fully automated) takes seven minutes on a fairly quick computer.

Rig Upgrades

Garex Electronics is pleased to announce that the GAREX/AKD Model 4001 4m transceiver is now available with CTCSS encode option. The modification consists of a simple plug-in PIC module that requires only one extra connection to feed the tone to the main board. Full details of the modification can be found on the GAREX website www.garex.co.uk.

The upgrade module is priced at £19.95, available by mail order from GAREX, as are new 4001 transceivers ready fitted with CTCSS priced at £164.95. The non-CTCSS model is £149.95. Carriage charges are extra.

It is accepted that there is not a great demand for the CTCSS facility at 4m, but getting it to work on the 4001 was an essential first step to progressing to the more complicated software routines used in the other models, especially the AKD2001 2m rig. It is expected that these upgrades will be ready quite soon.
