

Since September 2008, all RSGB Operating awards have been handled by John Dunnington, G3LZQ. Here's an update on the developments in the last couple of years.

OCTOBER 2007. The ARRL/IARU simplified production of the Worked all Continents Award (WAC) and the associated 5-band Award. Claims must still be made through local IARU Affiliated Societies but a limited number of Societies have been granted permission to locally print the certificates. This has now reduced turnaround times to a few days rather than many weeks when a monthly consolidated shipment to USA and then an equal return period was in place. Software has been provided by IARU with the benefit that mode endorsements and callsigns can now be printed on the certificate.

JANUARY 2008. CQ Magazine and eQSL announced that eQSL confirmations would count for credit for CQ's various prestigious award programmes. Only confirmations from 'Authenticity Guaranteed' members of eQSL will be accepted and, in accordance with existing eQSL policy, a membership level of bronze or higher is required in order to participate in award programs via eQSL. This announcement initially led to many direct e-mail enquiries regarding not only the position of CQ and eQSL award claims but also to the current status of RSGB and eQSL confirmations for its own awards programme.

At this time, the RSGB has no plans to change the requirement that traditional QSL cards are required to support RSGB award applications from both HF and VHF programmes. Discussions have taken place with ARRL to be able to use Logbook of the World (LOTW) credits towards IOTA Awards at some stage in the future, but there are a number of technical difficulties to be overcome before this can happen. Currently, the RSGB does accept confirmations from the Commonwealth Awards Series providing both parties in a QSO have submitted a log and it

has been accepted by the contest adjudicator. A list of claimed contest QSOs including Call, Date, Time, Band etc should be submitted direct to the RSGB Awards Manager.

Applications for the CQ awards programme should be submitted according to rules on the eQSL website. Hybrid applications mixing both traditional QSL cards and the eQSL printout confirmation sheet should have their cards authorised by official CQ Checkpoints. A full list of awards & forms are available from the CQ Website. See www.cq-amateur-adio.com/awards.html. UK checkpoints are GM3YTS and G3LZQ, both are QTHR.

AWARD CHASERS. RSGB Operating Awards continue to be keenly sought after by award chasers across the world. Most popular are the IARU Region 1 Award with a minimum requirement of 40 Member Societies and the Basic 100 Commonwealth Call Areas. RSGB caters for the dedicated short wave listener by having a special DXCLA Award for confirmation of at least 100 DXCC entities. Several keen SWLs have over 300 countries

ARDF comes to Scotland

It is the classic chicken and egg situation. There are no ARDF (Amateur Radio Direction Finding) events in Scotland because no one has got suitable transmitters to run one and no individual is much interested in acquiring ARDF receiving equipment because there are no events to attend.

How do you break the 'deadlock'? Answer: have a seminar to introduce this terrific facet of amateur radio to Scottish amateurs. This kind of Sport Radio offers interest to youngsters that might be missing from other radio activities.

The RSGB ARDF Committee is running a seminar at Mugdock Country Park, Milngavie on Saturday 18 April with the help of the two Scottish amateurs who currently travel to England to compete. Three Committee members will travel to Mugdock Park to introduce the concept of ARDF using the IARU rules and then have sessions devoted to the skills needed to find hidden transmitters on the 144MHz band and also on the 3.5MHz band. Each of these sessions will be followed by a mini DF hunt in the grounds of the Park to put into practice the techniques that have been presented. Equipment will be provided for participants to use.

There will be a small shop selling kits and complete receivers and transmitters for both of the frequency bands that are used. The RSGB book on ARDF will also be on sale.

A fee of £11 covers the cost of lunch (hot and cold buffet), tea, coffee and biscuits all day plus a map of the Park. The cost of hiring the venue is being met by the RSGB.

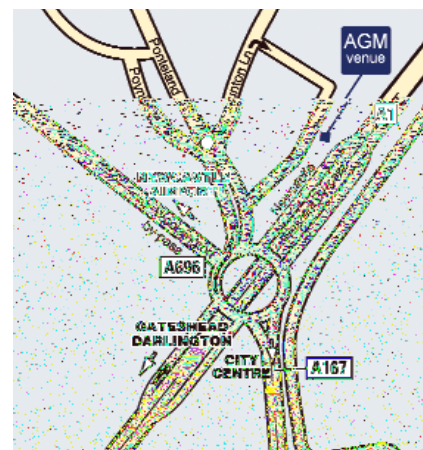

Icom IC-7600

Icom have announced the UK arrival of the IC-7600, an HF + 50MHz transceiver. The IC-7600 is the successor to the IC-756PRO3 and has been enhanced with some of the main features of Icom's flagship models IC-7700/7800. For example, the IC-7600 features the same level of receiver performance as the top of the range IC-7700/7800 transceivers. Its three first IF roofing filters (3kHz, 6kHz and 15kHz) allow you to pull out a weak signal while blocking strong adjacent signals. The double superheterodyne receiving system improves the in-band IMD (intermodulation distortion) significantly over the IC-756PRO3. In addition, the performance of the spectrum scope is first class thanks to the dedicated DSP. The IC-7600 will be available at the start of March and will be available from all authorised Icom amateur radio dealers. Pricing is still to be confirmed. We hope to bring you the review of this radio in the May issue.

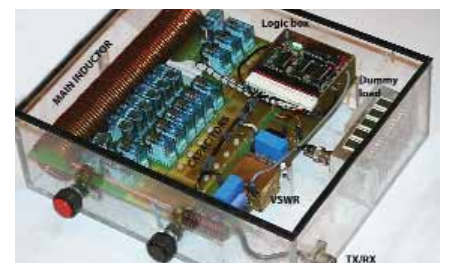


Isoterm Multimode

Johnny Merlvin, G3LIV has just released a brand new fully isolated interface for amateur data enthusiasts. The Muliterm takes care of all the main connections for data work and is fully isolated. Measuring just 105mm (w) x 125mm (d) and 32mm (h), the Multimode features both RX and TX drive controls and a push switch to allow both PTT and RX audio to be switched the 6 and 4 pin mini DIN sockets. The front panel also has indicators LEDs and a Key jack for CW use. On the rear panel are the 4 and 6 pin DIN sockets along with stereo jacks for the soundboard and a 9-pin COM port lead.

Cost is £88 plus £5 for UK postage which includes 9-pin RS232 connector and 2 x 3.5 mm Jack plugs for Soundboard connection plus the 6-pin mini DIN to transceiver cable.

New Year's Honour

Dave Bullock, G6UWO, has been awarded an MBE in the New Year's Honours List for his work for the Medical Research Council Institute of Hearing Research. By using his engineering skills and knowledge of radio design, much of which he accumulated as a radio amateur, he was able to fabricate novel devices for use in world class research into the causes and remedies of hearing loss.

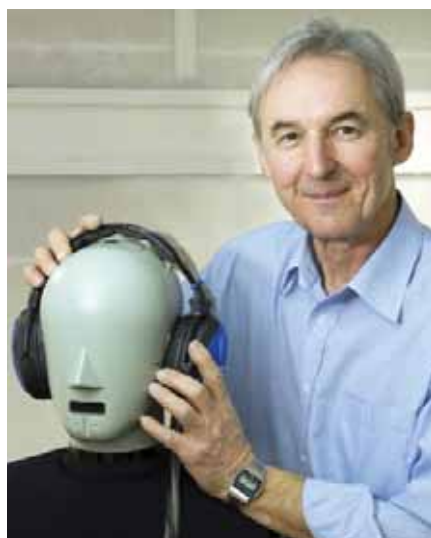
Some example devices are an easily tuneable surface coil for functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging of the auditory cortex, the application of basic acoustic principles to produce high quality transducers for evoking and measuring otoacoustic emission in neonates and the development of 48 channel 'localisation-of-sound' ring and high quality 'radiolucent' headphones for use inside the MR scanner.

Dave's work has enabled researchers to make valuable progress in the diagnosis and treatment of hearing disorders. His colleagues speak highly of his personal qualities - loyalty, determination, hard work, empathy and a sense of humour.

As an amateur, Dave has been a dedicated VHF/UHF man for many years. He obtained three senior awards for 144, 432 and 1296MHz, finally achieving the RSGB Supreme VHF/UHF award in 1994.

In recent years, Dave has taken a keen interest in amateur radio direction finding and teamed up with John, G0PSI, initially using a homebrew Doppler system, but continually seeking new ways to improve their performance. Now they use a PPI indicator with a built in a display unit from a Phantom fighter and GPSS software.

Dave is a modest man, but his achievements speak for themselves – hearing impaired patients, cochlear implant users and children suspected of hearing difficulties have all benefited from his work.



Lottery Award

The Chelmsford Amateur Radio Society recently applied for and was awarded a £10,000 grant from the National Lottery Awards for All Scheme that gives grants to local groups. The grant is to be used to further develop amateur radio training in the Chelmsford area as well as Radio Sports (contests) and a demonstration station in the 2MT hut in the Sandford Mill Science & Industry Museum. Among the equipment the club is purchasing with the grant are laptops, PC projector, amateur radio transceivers, HF linear and antennas.

In December, members of the Chelmsford Amateur Radio Society visited Waters and Stanton in Hockley, Essex. Peter Waters, G3OVJ presented them with the Lottery purchased equipment. Also present was Brian Reay, G8OSN, RSGB Board Member with Portfolio for Amateur Radio Development. Brian has been responsible for establishing the very successful Train the Trainers (TtT) scheme that offers amateur radio tutors some guidance on running courses and teaching techniques. So far six Chelmsford amateurs have attended TtT courses run by Brian.

G8PUT Logbook Project

The G8PUT logbook project was started just after the use of a logbook by UK radio amateurs had been made optional. Having been available as a trial version for some time, the first full release is now available. The program is a computerised logbook that has been designed to have easy entry of QSO details into a screen that looks just like a page in a log book. To enter a single QSO can take just two more key presses than there are letters in the callsign!

It allows for multiple contacts to remain open when operating in a Net and single stations can be logged out individually, or the whole Net closed at the press of a button. It also includes a rapid entry screen for contest working and an ever growing number of contests and awards.

The station was set up in the school hall, so that all the children could be involved in the occasion – as were some of the parents. The antennas were set up on the school roof, which was a 'challenging' exercise due to the inclement weather at the time.



Following the successful contact, Pilton Bluecoats Primary is now exploring the possibility of setting up a radio station at the school, both to learn how to design and broadcast programmes within the school and an amateur station with the aim of talking to other schools.

The presentation of the awards had to be postponed due to the dreadful weather that swept the country in early February.

The BWBF provides a range of DAB/FM radios including some with CD players and other functions. All are specially adapted for blind and partially sighted people and are available on free permanent loan to those in need.
